Safety

Please read this page before preparing your arcade cabinet for game play.

The following safety instructions apply to all game operators and service personnel. Specific warnings and cautions will be included throughout this manual.

Use the following safety guidelines to help protect the system from potential damage and to ensure your personal safety:

- Electronic components in the game cabinet run on 115 VAC. The voltage switch on the back of the computer must be set to 115. If you power up the computer outside of the cabinet, set the switch to match the local AC voltage:
 - 115 volts / 60Hz in most of North and South America and some Far Eastern countries such as Japan, South Korea and Taiwan
 - 230 volts / 50Hz in most of Europe, the Middle East and the Far East
- To help prevent electric shock, plug the system into a properly grounded power source. These cables are equipped with 3-prong plugs to help ensure proper grounding. Do not use adapter plugs or remove the grounding prong from a cable. If you must use an extension cable, use a 3-wire cable with properly grounded plugs.
- To help protect your system from sudden increases and decreases in electrical power, use a surge suppressor, line conditioner or Uninterruptible Power Supply (UPS).
- Be sure nothing rests on the system's cables and that the cables are not located where they can be stepped on or tripped over.
- Keep your system far away from radiators and other heat sources.
- Do not block cooling vents.

Dedicated Cabinet Installation

The 42" Deluxe Cabinet arrives ready to play, but it is a good practice to inspect the cabinet as described below. For 32" Standard Cabinets you will need to fold up the marquee and connect the seat assembly, as described in the following sections.

For Upgrade Cabinets, refer to the original cabinet documentation for setup information.

Unpack and Inspect Cabinet (All Cabinets)

- 1. Carefully remove the cabinet from the shipping container, giving yourself plenty of space. Inspect the exterior of the cabinet for any damage.
- 2. Remove the keys from the coin return slot. Open the coin door to locate the second set of keys.




Figure 2. Coin Door with Key Location

- 3. Locate the loose parts inside the cash box or in separate packaging. You should find the following items (may vary with cabinet style):
 - CAT-5 Network Cable
 - CAT-5 Crossover Coupler
 - AC Power Cord
 - Operation Manual (This Document)
- Service & Repair Manual
- Software Restore Guide
- System Recovery Disk (1 CD)
- Game Install Disk (1 DVD)
- Standard Cabinet Only: Hardware for Securing Seat Assembly and Marquee:
 - Two Seat Runners
 - Three 1/4-20 x 1" Torx screws with lock washers and flat washers
 - Four 1/4-20 x 1-1/4" hex bolts with lock washers and flat washers
 - Four 2-1/4" T-27 Torx screws with 1/4" lock washers and fender washers
- 4. It is advisable to check inside the cabinet in case any components have shifted or come loose during shipping. Remove the doors from the back of the cabinet and verify that all components are securely mounted, and all cables and wires are securely connected. See your *Service & Repair Manual* for wiring and connection diagrams.

- 5. To test cabinet operation, connect the AC power cord from the cabinet to a grounded (3-terminal) AC wall outlet and turn ON the ON/OFF switch on the lower rear of the cabinet.
- 6. Verify that the game boots properly and the Attract Movie starts. If any error messages appear, see page 20 for more information.
- 7. **Standard Cabinets:** Turn the cabinet OFF and disconnect the power cord before continuing with installation.

Marquee Setup (Standard Cabinet)



WARNING: Keep hands clear of area under marquee as you rotate it into place.

- 1. Rotate the marquee up towards the front of the cabinet, as shown in the figure below.
- 2. Secure the marquee with three (3) 1/4-20 x 1" Torx screws with lock washers and flat washers through the holes in the metal bracket below the marquee, as shown below.




Figure 3. Setting up the Marquee (Standard)

Seat Assembly Installation (Standard Cabinet)

1. Insert the seat runners so that they extend out from the cabinet, as shown below. Secure each runner with four (4) $1/4-20 \times 1-1/4$ " hex-head bolts with lock washers and flat washers.








Figure 4. Installing the Seat Runners

- 2. Slide the seat assembly onto the seat runners, leaving enough space to connect the harnesses
- 3. Connect the three (3) harness connectors between the cabinet and seat assembly.
- 4. Slide the seat assembly towards the cabinet while guiding the wire harnesses inside. Attach the seat assembly to the seat runners using four (4) 2-1/4" T-27 Torx screws with 1/4" lock washers and fender washers.

Optional: Bolting Cabinets Together (Standard Cabinets)

Contact your GLOBAL VR Distributor if you wish to order Cabinet Connector Brackets, GLOBAL VR Part #: 37271-00.

If you are setting up multiple Standard Cabinets, you can install two optional Connector Brackets between them, as shown below. This adds stability and prevents possible damage from the monitor housings bumping each other. Secure each bracket with four (4) $\frac{1}{4}$ -20 x 1" hex-head bolts with lock washers and flat washers.

Power on and Test

- 1. Power the cabinet on and verify proper operation.
- 2. Press the **Test** button inside the coin door to open the Operator Menu, and select **Diagnostics** to test all controls, audio, and the card reader.
- 3. Use the Operator Menus to set up audio volume, pricing, and other Operator Settings. Refer to the *Operation Manual* for details on using the Operator Menus.

Linking Cabinets

You can link up to four cabinets for head-to-head competition. Once the cabinets are linked in hardware and software, the Attract Movies will synchronize, and players can choose to play individually or race against other players. Motion and Non-Motion Cabinets can be linked together if desired.

New Dedicated Cabinets ship with a CAT-5 (8-wire) Ethernet cable and cross-over coupler. The cross-over coupler is used to link two cabinets. To link three or four cabinets, connect the Ethernet cable from each cabinet to an Ethernet hub or switch (not included). Dedicated Cabinets require a 10/100/1000 Mbps (Gigabit) hub or switch.

Important: Some older Need for SpeedTM systems shipped with couplers that were not CAT-5 compliant. These couplers cannot be used to link Dedicated Cabinets. Be sure to use the coupler that came with your Dedicated Cabinet.




Figure 6. Linking Cabinets

Follow the steps below to link your cabinets:

1. **Before connecting the Ethernet cables** open the Operator Menu **Machine Settings: Settings** menu on each cabinet and set the Link ID number. Cabinets should be numbered in sequence from left to right, and each cabinet must have a unique number: 1, 2, 3, or 4. Exit from the Operator Menu to reset the number in the software.

Important: All linked cabinets must run the same **Software Comm Version**, displayed in the Operator Menu **Machine Info** screen.

- 2. **To link two cabinets:** Connect an Ethernet cable to the Ethernet port on the power plate of each cabinet. Connect the two cables together with a crossover coupler. For Dedicated Cabinets, make sure the coupler is CAT-5 compliant (8-wire).
- 3. **To link three or four cabinets:** Connect an Ethernet cable from the Ethernet port on the power plate of each cabinet to an Ethernet hub or switch (not included). For Dedicated Cabinets or a mix of Dedicated and Upgrades, the hub or switch must support 10/100/1000 Mbps (Gigabit) connection speed. Connect the Hub or Switch to AC power. **DO NOT use a crossover coupler with a hub or switch**.

Linking Errors

Each cabinet must have a unique Cabinet Link ID number. If the software detects a duplicate Link ID number, the *Select A Link ID* screen, shown below, will automatically appear and prompt you to change the number. Numbers shown in a gray cabinet image are available. Turn the wheel to select a number and then press the **START** button.



Cabinet Mismatch Errors

Make sure the Game Settings and Coin Settings are the same for all linked cabinets. You will have unhappy customers if a setting such as *Winner Gets Free Game* is enabled on some cabinets and disabled on others. If the settings listed below are mismatched on linked cabinets, a Blue Dot will appear in the Attract Mode, and you will see an explanation of the problem in the **Machine Settings: Errors** screen.

- Software Comm Version
- Free Game Min Players
- Winner gets Free Game
- Disabled Tracks

Cabinet Linking Troubleshooting

The issues below can prevent cabinets from linking properly.

Cause	Possible Solution
Faulty wiring	Verify that an Ethernet cable is connected between the Ethernet port on the AC Power Plate and the computer. CAT-5 (8-wire) cables are required for Dedicated Cabinets. While the cabinet is powered on and connected to another cabinet, verify the green LED on the Ethernet card is lit. If you are using an Ethernet hub or switch, verify green LEDs on the hub or switch light for each Ethernet port that is connected.
Cross-over coupler not used or used improperly	To connect two cabinets, use one cross-over coupler. Do not run an Ethernet cable directly between two cabinets without a coupler. A CAT-5 (8-wire) coupler is required for Dedicated Cabinets. Do not use a crossover coupler with a hub or switch.
Cross-over coupler is not CAT-5	For Dedicated Cabinets, use the CAT-5 (8-wire) coupler that came with your Cabinet.
Faulty Ethernet hub or switch	Verify the LEDs on the Ethernet hub or switch are lit for each port used. If possible, verify the hub or switch is working by connecting it to a known working computer network or set of linked cabinets.

Cause	Possible Solution
Hub or switch is not	Dedicated Cabinets or a mix of Dedicated and Upgrade Cabinets require a
10/100/1000 Mbps	10/100/1000 Mbps (Gigabit) hub or switch to link three or four cabinets.
Duplicate Link ID	A cabinet with a duplicate Link ID number will display the Select A Link ID menu.
numbers	You can also check or change the Link ID from the Operator menu Machine
	Settings: Settings screen. Each cabinet in a linked group must have a unique
	Link ID number.
Mixed Software	Verify that all cabinets are running the same Comm Version, shown in Machine
Comm Versions	Settings: Info screen.

Checking the Game Dongle

The cabinet uses a Game Dongle to activate the game software. If the dongle is missing, the game will not run. When a USB Game Dongle is installed and working properly, a **red** LED will illuminate inside the dongle.

For a Game Dongle to be recognized correctly, it should be connected before the cabinet is powered ON. If the software does not recognize the Game Dongle, the **Dongle Missing or Invalid** screen will appear. Make sure the Dongle is connected properly, and then power cycle the cabinet.

Note: The dongle supplied with the cabinet is specific to the game software version. Future software upgrades may require a new dongle. If the dongle does not match the software, the **Dongle Missing or Invalid** screen will appear.

Important: Some of your cabinet information is stored in the dongle, so if you replace your computer, **remove the dongle and keep it with the cabinet**.




Figure 7. USB Game Dongle

Maintenance Restart Feature

To keep the software running optimally, the cabinet will restart itself every 24 hours. The automatic restart will not occur if the operator turns the cabinet off every day. The maintenance restart occurs according to the following conditions:

1. If the game has been running continuously for at least 24 hours, and the game has been in Attract Mode (not played) for at least 15 minutes, then the following screen will be displayed:



2. The screen will count down for 30 seconds.

If a user presses the **START** button, the screen will not appear again until the next time the Attract Mode has been running for 15 minutes.

If nobody presses the **START** button, the game will shut down and restart, which will take about 3 minutes.

3. After the cabinet completes the Restart, the next Restart will be scheduled for 24 hours later. If the initial Restart happens to be scheduled during a busy time for your location, the action of players pressing **START** to postpone will move the restart to a time that is not busy.

Hint: To force the restart to happen at a certain time (such as after closing time), power cycle the cabinet at that time. The next restart will be scheduled for 24 hours later.

To see how much time is left before the next maintenance restart, check the **Machine Settings: Info** screen in the Operator Menu (see your Operation Manual for detailed information on using the Operator Menus). This screen also tells you how much time has passed since the last power cycle and the last maintenance restart.

Chapter 2 — Driving a Race

Insert coins and press the **START** button.

The Select Track screen will appear first. Turn the wheel to highlight a Circuit, Drift, or Career Mode (see page 14 for more on Career Mode). Tracks are rated *Easy*, *Medium*, or *Hard*; Kings Park Drift is rated *Insane*. Press the gas pedal to select a track. If the operator has locked out expert tracks (Career and Drift) press and hold \$\mathcal{L}\$ while selecting to unlock an expert track.

Once you coin up and press **START**, all other linked cabinets in Attract Mode will display the "Join Now" screen. Players who coin up and press **START** will automatically join the race, and skip the Select Track screen. (If you want to race solo or Career on another cabinet, wait for the race to begin before you press **START**.)

The Select Car screen will appear next. Turn the wheel to see the available cars, and press the gas pedal to select. You can also select the Additional Race Options described on page 14.

Next, the customization screen appears. Use the wheel and gas pedal to pick your paint color, vinyl, and wheels. If you prefer, you can press **VIEW** to instantly customize your car, and then press the gas pedal to accept.

When the Select Transmission screen appears, use the wheel and gas pedal to select either Automatic or Manual Transmission.

If you are on a linked cabinet, the Waiting for Drivers screen will appear after you select your Transmission. Otherwise, the game will load, and hint screens will appear while the game loads.

Note: If you select Drift there are no AI Cars. You race against a ghost and any players on linked cabinets. Drift mode is tuned to simulate a real drifting experience.











Logging In

If you select Career, the Login screen will open. (You can only create a new account from Career.) Do the following to create your account from the Career Login screen:

- a. Follow the onscreen instructions to enter a PIN.
- b. **Optional:** Insert a magnetic-stripe card (such as credit card or library card) or a GLOBAL VR Players' SmartCard, in the card reader. The software will use the card to identify you. **No data is copied from the card.** Remove your card when prompted.
- c. Enter the nickname you want to use.

When you come back to the same cabinet, or a cabinet linked to it, you can login with either your PIN **or** your card. Your Career Data is stored in the game, **not** on your card.

To login to your account, either select Career or press **LOOK BACK** from the Select Car screen to open the Login screen.

If you login, your nickname will be displayed in the Race Results, and you can use cars earned in Career Mode to drive in Race Mode. Using a **GLOBAL VR Players' SmartCard** in Race Mode rewards you with an additional car. If a card dispenser is installed, you can buy a card from the Career Login screen.

Career Mode

In Career Mode, players drive a series of races. After a certain number of races, they can win additional cars to add to their garage. If a player selects Career, the Login screen automatically appears. Press the **E-Brake** to return to Select Track without logging in.

Career Mode cars and stats are saved on the System Computer and shared with other cabinets linked to it at the location. When players login, their data is retrieved from the computer. No data is written to the cards.

A career is made up of three sets of cars, **Exotic**, **Tuner**, and **Muscle**. Each set has 25 races. When you complete all three sets, the bonus **Extreme** set is unlocked.

Players can complete two careers. Each career has different cars to earn. Players can use their special cars in Race Mode.

Additional Race Options

- Press **NOS** to turn AI on or off. Turning AI off removes computer-controlled cars from the track. In a linked race, any player can turn AI off for all cabinets in the race. (In a four-player linked race, AI is off by default and cannot be turned on.) For a driver racing solo, turning AI off activates **Time Attack Mode**, in which the driver races against a shadow of the track leader.
- Press ☐ to toggle the Steering Force-Feedback level between Lite and Medium.

Driving Controls

As in any driving game, use the Steering Wheel, Gas, Brake, and Shifter (if you selected Manual Transmission) to control the car. Additional controls are described below:

- The **LOOK BACK** button lets you look behind the car.
- The **VIEW** button toggles the view between inside and outside the car.
- Tap the Γ button to turn the music off; tap it again to change songs.
- Press the **NOS** button for an extra burst of speed. NOS recharges throughout the race.
- Tap the **E-Brake** button to aid in navigating sharp turns.

Amusement Race Screen

During the race, useful information is displayed onscreen, as described below. Additional hint screens may appear during the race to tell you about controls you have not used.



- 1. Shows the number of seconds you have to cross the next checkpoint.
- 2. Shows your current position and race time.
- 3. Shows your position (blue triangle) relative to the other cars (gray triangles) on track map.
- 4. Shows the percentage of the race completed.
- 5. Shows your player number and the amount of NOS you have left.
- 6. Shows your speed in either km/h or MPH (set in the Game Operator menu).
- 7. For Manual Transmission only, shows engine speed (tachometer) to help you shift at the optimal time.
- 8. For Manual Transmission only, shows your current gear.

At the end of the race, each driver's time and position is displayed. If you are racing in Career Mode, the screen tells you if you completed the goal, as shown on the right below.






Chapter 3 — Operator Menu and Game Setup

This chapter describes how to use the Game Operator menu to set up the game, diagnose problems, and view gameplay and earnings statistics.

Navigating the Operator Menu

- 1. With the game running in Attract Mode, open the coin door to locate the Operator Button Panel. Upgrade Cabinets have a single Operator Button that opens the menus. Dedicated Cabinets have four buttons; press the **TEST/BACK** button to open the menus.
- 2. Once you enter the Operator Menu, use the **VIEW** and \mathcal{I} buttons to move up and down through the main list on the left side of the screen. Pause over a menu item to open the submenu below it, and then use the **VIEW** and \mathcal{I} buttons to move through the submenu items.
- 3. When you move over a submenu item, a blue highlight will appear around the item. Press the **START** button to open the associated menu or screen.
- 4. Once you open a menu, use the **VIEW** and ♪ buttons to navigate through the menu items. Press **START** to select an item and change its setting
- 5. Some menu items, such as volume levels (see Figure 10 on page 19) use sliders to set numeric values. A slider, as shown below, will appear when you highlight the item and press **START**. To set the slider, press the **VIEW** and ♪ buttons to increase or decrease the value, and then press **START** again to save the selected value.



6. Some items use popup menus to select settings, as shown below. The popup menu will appear when you highlight the item and press **START**. Press the **VIEW** and **\$\(\sigma\)** buttons to select from the popup menu, and then press **START** again to save the selected value.



- 7. When you finish with a menu, press the **LOOK BACK** button to return to the main menu list on the left side of the screen.
- 8. To exit from the Operator Menu, highlight **Resume Game** at the bottom of the menu list (press **LOOK BACK** to instantly highlight **Resume Game**) and press **START**.




Figure 8. Operator Menu Flowchart

Notes: The **current date and time** is displayed on each menu screen. If you need to change the date or time, refer to *Setting the Date and Time* in your Service & Repair Manual. The date and time only appears on Operator Menu screens and does not affect gameplay.

Machine Settings: Info Screen

This screen is displayed first when you press the **TEST/BACK** Button. It displays important information about the cabinet, and contact information for GLOBAL VR.




Figure 9. Machine Info Screen

Menu Item	Description
Region	Displays the region or country of operation.
Cabinet Type	Displays the cabinet type, Standard/Deluxe or Motion.
Game Version	Displays the installed software game version.
Shell Version	Displays the software shell version.
OS Version	Displays the operating system version.
Dongle Flag	In some regions <i>Winner Gets Free Game</i> is not allowed. In these areas the dongle flag will be set to <i>Free Game Option Disabled</i> , and that option will not appear on the Game Settings: Settings menu.
Dongle Version	Displays the localized version of the software, as read from the Game Dongle.
PLUS Version	Displays the PLUS data engine version.
IO Board	Displays the version of I/O PCB Installed, either Nytric on Upgrade Cabinets or GVRI/O Mini on Carbon Dedicated Cabinets.
Comm Version	Displays the communication software version. (Linked cabinets must run the same version.)
Link ID	Displays the Cabinet Link ID number.
MAC Address	Displays the MAC address of the system computer. This number may be useful to Tech Support for troubleshooting certain cabinet linking problems.
P2P Send	Displays the last time player data was sent to other linked cabinets.
P2P Receive	Displays the last time player data was received from other linked cabinets.
Last Power-Cycle	Displays the amount of time since the cabinet was last powered on.
Previous Maintenance Restart	Displays the amount of time since the cabinet did an automatic maintenance restart.
Next Maintenance Restart	Displays the amount of time until the cabinet does an automatic maintenance restart.

Machine Settings: Settings Menu

This menu lets you set up audio, Service Credit Switch (if applicable), steering feedback strength, and Link IDs. It also displays available Service and Paid Credits.




Figure 10. Machine Settings Menu

Menu Item	Description
Master Volume	Sets the overall cabinet volume from 0—100.
Attract Volume (Relative to Master)	Sets the Attract Mode volume from 0%—100% of Master Volume.
Sound Configuration	Sets sound configuration to Surround (for sit-down cabinets) or Stereo (for upright cabinets with no seat or rear speakers).
Attract Audio	Sets how often the Attract Mode sound plays. Options are <i>Never</i> , <i>Sometimes (1/3)</i> , or <i>Always</i> . The <i>Sometimes 1/3</i> setting plays Attract Audio 1/3 of the time.
Service Credits Switch (Carbon Dedicated Cabinets Only)	If set to <i>Enable</i> , lets you add Service Credits by pressing the SERVICE button on the Operator Button Panel during Attract Mode. (Applies only to Dedicated Cabinets with four Operator buttons.) Service Credits can be used for testing gameplay, and are counted separately from Paid Credits in the collection statistics screens.
Steering Feedback Strength	Sets how strong the Steering Force Feedback feels. Options are <i>Normal</i> or <i>Light</i> .
Motion Platform Strength (Motion Cabinets Only)	Sets how strong the Motion feels. Options are Light, Medium, or Heavy.
Link ID	Select this item and press START to open the <i>Select a Link ID</i> screen (see page 10). Turn the wheel to select a Link ID number and press START .
	Note: Link IDs should be sequential from left to right for a set of linked cabinets. If two cabinets have duplicate link IDs they will not link, and the <i>Select A Link ID</i> screen will automatically appear.
Service Credits	Shows how many Service Credits are currently available. (Applies only to Carbon Dedicated Cabinets. Service Credits Switch must be set to Enable in this menu to add Service Credits with the Operator SERVICE button.)
Paid Credits	Shows how many Paid Credits are currently available on the cabinet.

Machine Settings: Errors Screen

The Errors screen displays errors detected by the system software. Some errors cause a message to be displayed at boot. Non-critical boot error messages, such as *Card Reader Missing* will time-out after 30 seconds. Critical errors, such as *Dongle Missing or Invalid*, will prevent the game from booting.

If you open the Operator Menu while an error is detected, a message box will appear with the error message. Press **START** to close the message box. Open the Errors Screen for a list of any detected errors.

Error Messages

This table lists error messages that you may see at boot or on the Errors screen.

Error Message	Explanation and Solution
No Dongle	Make sure the USB Game Dongle is firmly connected. Try a different USB port if the dongle is not detected after a reboot.
Invalid Dongle: Incorrect Game Version	Dongle does not match game version. If you upgrade the software, be sure to connect the corresponding Game Dongle.
There is a CD in the Drive	Eject the CD from the drive. Press the START button to continue to boot the game if you see this message at boot.
Error Detected with IO Board	The Nytric USBI/O PCB is either disconnected or malfunctioning.
Error Detected with GVRIO Board (Dedicated Cabinets only)	The GVRI/O Mini PCB is either disconnected or malfunctioning. Check all connections to the PCB. Replace the PCB if faulty.
Incorrect GVRIO Board (Dedicated Cabinets only)	The screen will display the revision numbers of the GVRI/O Mini PCB installed, and the one required. Contact your distributor to order the correct GVRI/O Mini PCB.
Select a Link ID (Screen appears if a duplicate Link ID is detected)	The cabinet has the same Link ID as another cabinet. Turn the wheel to select a different Link ID from the screen and press START . Number the cabinets in sequence from left to right.
Steering Auto Calibration failed. Please turn the wheel all he way to the left and all the way to the right	The software detected a problem with steering. Once you turn the wheel, the software will determine whether the problem is with the steering pot or the force-feedback. If the problem is with the force feedback, you will be given the option to start the system without force feedback. If the steering pot is not working, the game cannot be started. See your Service & Repair Manual for steering service procedures.
Card Dispenser is Empty	Message will appear at boot on Upgrade Cabinet with a Players' Card Dispenser if the dispenser is empty. Card sales are automatically disabled when the dispenser is empty.
Card Reader Missing	Message will appear at boot if the card reader is not detected.
Attract Mode Error Messages	Explanation and Solution
A Red Dot appears in the lower right corner of the Attract Screen	Indicates a hardware error, usually with a button, gas or brake pot, or steering. An explanation is displayed in the Errors screen.
A Blue Dot appears in the lower right corner of the Attract Screen	Indicates a Cabinet Mismatch in linked cabinets. An explanation is displayed in the Errors screen. The following conditions will cause a Blue Dot error message: • Winner Gets Free Game not set the same on all cabinets • Free Game Min Players not set the same on all cabinets • Different Software Comm Version on one or more cabinets • Different Tracks Disabled on one or more cabinets

Game Settings: Settings Menu

This menu lets you set up game-play options and backup player data.




Figure 11. Game Settings Menu

Menu Item	Description
Play Again/Continue	If set to <i>Enable</i> , allows you to set different pricing to start playing or continue (play again). Set the pricing from Coin Settings: Pricing .
Play Again Max Times	Lets you set the maximum number of times a player can use <i>Continue</i> . Options are 1, 2, or <i>Unlimited</i> .
Winner Gets Free Game*	If set to Enable, the winner of a race gets a free game.
Free Game Min Players*	If Winner Gets Free Game is enabled, this sets the minimum number of players required for the free game to be awarded. Options are 1—4.
Solo Free Game Max in Row*	If Winner Gets Free Game is enabled, and Free Game Min Players is set to 1, this sets the maximum number of times in a row the free game can be awarded. Options are 1—3 Times.
Expert Track Lockout	If set to <i>Enable</i> , players have to press the ♪ button to select an Expert track. This prevents novice players from selecting an Expert track (Drift or Career) accidentally from the Track Select screen.
3 Button Game Abort	If set to <i>Enable</i> , a solo race can be aborted by pressing the VIEW , \$\mathcal{J}\$, and NOS buttons at the same time.
Shifter Control	Set to <i>Disable</i> to remove the Select Transmission screen and default to Automatic Transmission. Useful if 6-speed shifter is not installed or broken.
Speed Units	Sets speed units to display in MPH or km/h.
Attract High Score Screens	Sets whether to display high scores during Attract Mode.
Backup Drive	Selects drive letter for USB backup drive. See page 21 for details.
Backup Player Data	Writes player data to a USB drive. (See next page for details.)
Restore Player Data	Restores player data saved to a USB drive. (See next page for details.)

Backing Up and Restoring Player Data

Need for SpeedTM Carbon saves all player data for Career Mode, custom cars, and miles, in the System Computer. If cabinets are linked, player data is shared between the cabinets. No data is written to Players' Cards.

To keep Player Data safe, you can back it up on any standard USB Flash Drive that works with Windows[®]. (Do not use a Flash Drive that requires special drivers to be installed on the computer.)

Important: GLOBAL VR recommends that you have at least 64 MB of free space on your drive before you back up data. The data will be stored in a folder called "CARBON_BACKUP". You can copy the folder to a computer for safe keeping if you wish. The folder will contain the six files listed below:

gameresult_backup.log gameresult.tbl careerprofilecard_backup.log careerprofilecard.tbl careerprofile.tbl

Since Player Data is shared between linked cabinets, you only need to back up the data from one cabinet in a linked set. If you wish, you can install a USB Extension Cable, as described on page 23, to make it easier to connect the drive.

When you Restore Player Data, the data from the USB drive will replace the data on the cabinet. If the cabinet is not linked, the existing data is lost. If the cabinet is linked, the data is merged with the data on the other cabinets, and no data is lost.

Important: Always backup the player data before installing software. When you run the System Recovery Disk you will erase all player data.

Backing Up Player Data

- 1. Open **Game Settings: Settings** in the Operator Menu. If your Flash Drive is not connected, you will see the Drive Not Connected message onscreen.
- 2. If your Flash Drive has more than one partition, scroll down to **Backup Drive:** and select the drive letter to use. (If you are not sure whether your drive has partitions, try using the default Drive **E:** first.)
- 3. Connect the USB Flash Drive to the computer, if not already done.

Note: If you connect the drive when the Game Settings: Settings menu is open, the Drive Not Connected message will remain onscreen, but the drive will still work normally. To clear the message, exit from the **Game Settings**: **Settings** menu and then return.

- 4. Use the ♪ button to highlight the Backup Player Data button, and press START.
- 5. When the dialog box appears, use the J button to highlight Yes, Backup Player Data, and press START. When the backup is finished, "Done, Successful Backup" will appear onscreen. Press START to close the message box.

If you see an error message, make sure write-protection is off for the drive (if applicable), and try a different letter under **Backup Drive:**.

6. Remove the drive and keep the data in a safe place.

Restoring Player Data

- 1. Open Game Settings: Settings in the Operator Menu.
- 2. Connect the USB drive with the data files to the computer, if not already done.
- 3. Use the

 ∫ button to highlight Restore Player Data, and press START.
- 4. When the dialog box appears, use the **J** button to highlight the Yes, Restore Player Data button, and press START. When restore is finished, "Done, Successful Restore" will appear onscreen. Press START to close the message box.
- 5. You can safely remove the drive now. The player data is now restored. If the cabinet is linked, the data will be merged with the existing data on the linked cabinets shortly.

Installing a USB Extension Cable

For your convenience, you can run a USB cable from the computer to the area inside the coin door and use it to backup player data. Use a standard USB "A" Extension Cable, 3' or longer. Either USB 1.1 or 2.0 is fine.

Connect one end of the cable to the computer and run the other into the area inside the coin door. Secure it in a convenient location with a cable tie or adhesive Velcro[®]. Make sure the cable won't get caught in the door or interfere with the coin mechs.

Now you can open the coin door and easily backup player data.

Game Settings: Disable Tracks Menu

This screen allows you to disable or enable any tracks or Career Mode. Disabled tracks do not show up in the Select Track screen.

Note: If linked cabinets do not have the same tracks available, a blue dot will appear in the lower right corner of the Attract screen on each cabinet, to indicate a Cabinet Mismatch.



Game Settings: Game Resets Menu

This menu lets you restore factory default settings, or reset cabinet statistics, standings, or available credits. When you select any reset button except Reset Credits, a confirmation box will appear, allowing you to accept or cancel your reset selection.




Figure 12. Game Resets Menu

Reset Service Credits	Resets available Service Credits to 0. Does not affect Paid Credits. The number next to the button shows available Service Credits.

Coin Settings: Configuration Menu

This menu lets you turn free play on or off, select the Money Display Prompt, and reset credits.




Figure 13. Coin Settings: Configuration Menu

Reset Paid Credits	Resets available Paid Credits To 0. Does not affect Service Credits. The number next to the button shows available credits. Any Paid Credits displayed when you reset are counted as Unspent Monies in the Collections screens. (There is no confirmation prompt.)
Service Credits	Displays the number of Service Credits currently available.
Reset Service Credits	Resets available Service Credits to 0. (There is no confirmation prompt.)

Coin Settings: Pricing Menu

This menu lets you set the number of credits required to start or continue a game, and to buy a Players' Card if a dispenser is installed.




Figure 14. Coin Setting: Pricing Menu

Collections Screens

The **Current Earnings** screen displays Earnings and Service Credits for the current period. Earnings are displayed in Credits only.

When you select **Reset Bookkeeping**, and then confirm in the confirmation box that appears, all amounts are reset to zero (0) in the Current Earnings screen, and the data is moved to the **Last Collection** screen.

Lifetime Earnings and Lifetime Average Weekly Earnings are displayed on the **Statistics: Machine** screen described on page 28.

If the cabinet does not have a Players' Card Dispenser installed, the earnings for Players' Cards will always be 0.





Figure 15. Collections Screens

Statistics Screens

The Statistics screens allow the operator to view the gameplay statistics collected by the cabinet. The lifetime totals are never reset unless the operating system is restored using the System Recovery Disk. To reset the current Total for any screen, use the **Game Settings: Game Resets** menu described on page 21.



Statistics: Machine displays general statistics about the cabinet.

Lifetime Earnings — total earnings for cabinet.

Lifetime Avg. Weekly Earnings — earnings per week averaged over cabinet lifetime.

Lifetime Duration — the date the operating system was installed. This is updated if you run the System Recovery Disk.

Lifetime Time in Play — total time the cabinet has spent being played.

Lifetime Average Play Time — lifetime average length of a game.


Time in Play — total time the cabinet has spent being played since the last reset.


Average Play Time — average length of a game since the last reset.


Lowest Play Time — shortest game ever played since the last reset.

Longest Play Time — longest game ever played since the last reset.


Up Time — total time the cabinet has been turned on since the last reset.









Statistics: Number of Players displays the number of multi-player games played on linked cabinets by the number of players per game. Shows Total for the current period, and Lifetime Total




Statistics: Car displays the number of games played using each car for the current period, and Lifetime Total.



Statistics: Track displays the number of games played using each track for the current period, and Lifetime Total.




Statistics: Transmission displays the number of games played with Automatic and Manual transmissions for the current period, and Lifetime Total.



Statistics: Game Time Stats displays a graph showing how long the games last. For example, in the graph at the left, 42 games lasted over 2 minutes, but less than 2 minutes and 20 seconds. Only 1 game lasted less than 1 minute and 20 seconds.

Press the **LOOK BACK** button to exit this screen.




Statistics: Continued Game Stats displays a graph showing how many times players Continued after a game ended. For example, in the graph at the left, 18 players continued once, and 8 players continued twice.

Press the **LOOK BACK** button to exit this screen.

Diagnostics: Play Control Test

The Play Control Test menu lets you test driving controls, operator buttons, and coin mechs, as described below. To exit from this menu, press the **START** and **VIEW** buttons together. If you see a \bigcirc symbol displayed over a pedal or the wheel, it was not detected by the software and may be disconnected. Try turning the wheel full left and right, or pressing the pedal full down and releasing. If still not detected, refer to your Service Manual.



- **Buttons**: When you press a control panel or Operator button, its picture should highlight on the screen. The dot next to each button should be yellow until the button is pressed, and stay green after it is pressed. A red dot means the button is stuck in the ON position. Upgrade Cabinets with Nytric I/O cards have only one Operator Button.
- Steering Wheel: When you turn the steering wheel, the graphic should rotate, and the number next to the graphic should change to indicate the steering wheel position. Full left position should be about -127 and full right position should be about 127. As you turn the wheel, the changing numbers should be smooth and linear. A sudden jump in the number, or a different range of numbers, can indicate a bad pot or a loose steering column set screw. The dot under the number should change from yellow to green when you turn the wheel.
- Gas & Brake Pedal: The numbers displayed next to the pedals show the pot value when the pedal is full up, full down, and the current value. When you step on the pedals, the number shown for the current position should change. The difference between the full up and full down values should be about $80 (\pm 5)$. As you press and release the pedals, the changing numbers should be smooth and linear. A sudden jump in the numbers can indicate a bad pot or a loose set screw on the pedal assembly. The dot above the pedal should change from yellow to green when you press the pedal.
- Calibrating the Steering and Pedals: To calibrate the steering wheel and pedals, press the START and ♪ buttons together to reset the pots to 0. A ② symbol will appear over the pictures of the pedals and wheel. Turn the steering wheel all the way to the left and the right to set the pot limits. Press each pedal all the way down to set the pot limits.
- **Shifter**: When you shift through the gears, the shifter in the graphic should move to the correct position. The dot above each shifter position should change from yellow to green when you move the shifter into that position, and then remain green.

- **Coin Mechs**: When you activate a coin mech, its name (Coin 1 or Coin 2) should turn from white to green, and the number should increment to indicate the number of credits inserted. If the name of the mech stays green, this indicates it is stuck in the ON position. (**Note:** Typically, Coin 1 is both coin mechs, and Coin 2 is the optional bill validator.)
- START Button and Leader Light: The START button and Leader Light should blink while the Play Control Test menu is open. If either one fails to blink, check the bulb and wiring.


Diagnostics: Comm Test

This screen shows the status of all linked cabinets, as well as their Comm version and region.

Diagnostics: Card Reader Test

This screen lets you test the Card Reader.

Open this screen and insert either a GLOBAL VR Operator or Players' SmartCard, or a different magnetic-stripe card. If the Card reader is working properly, the screen will confirm that the card was read successfully.





Diagnostics: Card Dispenser Test

This screen only appears on Upgrade Cabinets with the Nytric USBI/O PCB.

This screen lets you test the function of the Players' Card Dispenser, if installed. When you select this test the screen on the left below will be displayed and a card will be dispensed. Press **START** to dispense another card or any other button to exit.

If the card dispenser is empty or not detected by the software, the screen on the right will be displayed. Press any button to exit.





Diagnostics: Sound Test

This screen tests the speakers and subwoofer.

Once you enter the sound test, each speaker will play a sound while the graphic indicates the speaker that should be playing, and the onscreen text displays the name of the speaker. The screen on the left is displayed on sit-down cabinets with surround sound. The screen on the right is displayed on upright cabinets with no seat or rear speakers once you change the Sound Configuration to Stereo in the **Machine Settings: Settings** menu.

Press the ♪ button at any time to pause or resume the test. The test will repeat until you press the **LOOK BACK** button to exit.


If any sound comes from the wrong speaker, or any speakers are not working, check the connections to the speakers, audio amp, and PC. Please see your Service Manual for more information on fixing audio problems.





Diagnostics: Monitor Test Screens

The game has various screens to assist you with fine tuning the monitor.



- Monitor Test: When you select this menu item, it opens a series of screens designed to help you check monitor performance. Press any control panel button to cycle through a series of screens to test color and geometric alignment. Press the LOOK BACK button to exit
- Monitor Gamma: This screen lets you adjust the overall screen brightness. Press VIEW or ♪ to raise or lower the gamma value. To exit without making changes, press LOOK BACK. To exit and keep the new setting, press START.
- Monitor Vibrance: This screen lets you adjust the overall vividness, or saturation, of the colors. Press VIEW or ♪ to raise or lower the vibrance level. To exit without making changes, press LOOK BACK. To exit and keep the new setting, press START.
- **Monitor Resolution:** (Appears only on Dedicated Cabinets with GVRI/O Mini PCBs.) This screen lets you change the monitor resolution. This feature is provided to enhance compatibility with a variety of monitors. In most cases, the software detects and sets up the optimal monitor resolution automatically.

To change the resolution, press Γ or VIEW to cycle through the available options, and then press START to test the selected resolution. You will be prompted to press START again to keep the setting. Press LOOK BACK to exit without making any changes.

Diagnostics: Motion Test (Motion Cabinets Only)

This menu lets you test each motion drive motor individually, or test all three together.




Figure 16. Motion Test Menu

If you select Motion Test from the Main Menu with the motion STOP button down, you will be prompted to pull it up to activate motion.

Select a motor and press **START** to cycle the motor to the next position. The motor will move to the position shown onscreen.

Select ALL MOTORS and press **START** to cycle all three motors together. All three motors will move to the position shown onscreen. During this test, the platform should stay level. If it does not stay level, refer to your Service Manual.

Chapter 4 — Software Restoration



Important: When you run the System Recovery Disk, you will erase all game settings and audits. Open the Operator Menu and write down anything that you want to remember.

For best results, open the CD or DVD Drive and inspect the tray. If it is dirty, gently wipe it with a clean, soft cloth or use a CD Laser Lens Cleaner, available at electronics and music stores, and even drugstores, to clean the lens in the drive to help ensure it reads the software disks properly. If you should have continued problems with a drive, you can replace it with a plug-and-play compliant IDE CD or DVD-ROM drive.

Important: All linked cabinets must run the same software Comm version displayed in the Machine Info screen of the Operator Menu. (For best results, install the same software version on all linked cabinets.)

Total software installation time is typically about 20 minutes on a Dedicated Cabinet, and 30—45 minutes on an Upgrade Cabinet (or a Dedicated Cabinet using Game Install CDs).

Important: DO NOT RUN Software Version 1.0 on Dedicated Cabinets, and DO NOT RUN Software Version 1.1 on Upgrade Cabinets.

Run the System Recovery CD

- 1. Insert the System Recovery Disk in the DVD-ROM drive and power the cabinet OFF and then ON. When the computer reboots, the CD should run automatically (wait about 30 seconds). You will see messages onscreen as files are copied to the hard drive.
 - **Important:** The computer will eject the disk before it finishes the process. **Do not reboot** until the "System recovery successfully completed" screen appears.
- 2. After about 4—5 minutes, you will be prompted to remove the CD and reboot the computer. Do not insert the Game Install Disk yet! Wait for about 5 minutes while the software finishes the installation. (You may see a static screen with the GLOBAL VR logo for up to 90 seconds.) When the Operating System installation is complete, you will be prompted to insert Game Disk 1. Proceed to Run the Game Install DVD.

Dedicated Cabinets: Run the Game Install DVD

1. With the cabinet powered ON, insert the DVD labeled **Game Install Disk 1 of 1**. The DVD will automatically run (wait about 30 seconds). You will see a series of onscreen

- messages as the software copies components and files to the hard drive. After the software is configured the game will automatically reboot.
- 2. After about 11 minutes you will be prompted to remove the DVD and press **START**. Keep the disks in a safe place in case you need them in the future.

Upgrade Cabinets: Run the Game Install CDs

Note: If you get a CRC Error message during the install, you will have to start over with the System Recovery CD.

- 1. With the cabinet powered ON, insert the CD labeled Game Install Disk 1 of 5. The CD will automatically run (wait about 30 seconds). You will see a series of onscreen messages as the software copies components and files to the hard drive.
- 2. After about 3—4 minutes, the computer will eject the CD and prompt you to insert Disk 2. Insert Game Install Disk 2 of 5.
- 3. For each remaining Game Install Disk, the computer will eject the disk and prompt you to insert the next one. Each disk takes about 3 minutes to run. The computer will automatically reboot when Disk 5 finishes running. After about 3 minutes more you will be prompted to remove the CD and press START. It may take another minute or so for the Attract Movie to start.
- 4. Keep the CDs in a safe place in case you need them in the future.

Test and Set Up

- 1. As the game loads, you will be prompted to calibrate the accelerator and brake. Press each pedal firmly to the floor to set the calibration limits. Next, the steering will self-calibrate; Do not touch the wheel while it is calibrating.
- 2. If the software detects another cabinet with the same Link ID Number, the Select a Link ID screen will appear and prompt you to change the ID. (**Note:** If you install software on linked cabinets simultaneously, the first one finished will automatically be assigned Link ID #1, so you may need to change it in the Operator Menu.)
- 3. Once the attract movie begins, play one game to finalize hardware calibration and verify proper operation.
- 4. Press the Operator button and set the sound volume levels, cabinet Link ID Numbers, and any other desired cabinet settings from the Operator Menus.
- 5. **Upright (Stand-Up) Cabinets Only:** From the Operator **Machine Settings: Settings** menu, set Sound Configuration to *Stereo*. (The default setting of *Surround* is used for cabinets with seats and rear speakers.)
